

GREAT AYTON, 3 miles from Stokesley, 6 from Guisborough, is a township, parish and populous village, in the North Riding, union of Stokesley, west division of Langbaugh liberty, deanery of Cleveland, and archbishopric of York. The church of All Saints' is a low structure, the greater portion of remote origin, except the tower, which was rebuilt and the church repaired in 1790; it has a nave, chancel, porch, and 2 bells.

The living is a perpetual curacy, value ,£82 per annum, in the gift of George Marwnod, Esq., of Busby Hall, and held by the Rev. Joseph Ibbetson, M.A.; the Rev. George Robson is curate. The Independents, Wesleyans, Primitive Methodists, and Society of Friends, have each. a Chapel here. The school-house, u handsome building of stone, in the Gothic style of architecture, was erected and endowed at the sole expense of George Marwood, Esq. The residence for the master and mistress forms a portion of the building, which is a great ornament to the village. Great Ayton is pleasantly situated about a mile south of the conical mountain of Roseberry Topping; it consists principally of one broad street of a mile long, divided by a small rivulet which is crossed by a bridge of stone, also two others of wood. At the extremity of tile village is a square called HIGH GREEN, a great portion of the east side of which is occupied by the Friends' Meeting house, and the North of England Agricultural School, established in 1841. This is an extensive and remarkably neat building, under the care of Friends of Durham Quarterly meeting, for the gratuitous education and maintenance of 36 boys and 36 girls, under the superintendence of George Dixon; the former are instructed in reading, writing and arithmetic, also all the pursuits of horticulture and agriculture; the girls are trained for domestic purposes. The Hall, a very ancient edifice, is the seat and property of Thomas Graham, Esq. Cleveland Lodge, a handsome modern mansion, is the property and residence of Thomas Pease. Here are two tanneries, also a mill for crushing seed and making linseed cake, a brewery, and a water and steam floor mill. It was in this village the great circumnavigator, Captain Cook, was first taught to read and write,' and the churchyard contains a tombstone to the memory of his father and mother, who were Inhabitants of the village. The population of the township, In 1851, Was 1,109; and the area 3,140 acres.
